Overview

Achieving a just and sustainable global energy transition requires the active engagement of young people, who bring innovation, digital fluency, and new perspectives to the sector. They are set to be the future workforce, particularly in the renewable energy sector. Yet youth face significant barriers to participation, including limited access to quality education and training, insufficient representation in decision-making, and scarce funding for youth-led initiatives.

This session at IFESD 2025 will spotlight the role of youth as change agents in shaping the energy transition towards a just, resilient and decarbonized future. Building on global and regional experiences, including insights from ESCWA's recent report on the topic, UNECE's Resource Management Young Member Group's (RMYMG) white paper on advancing intergenerational equity and demand-side measures in resource management, ESCAP's recent publication Youth as Partners in Achieving SDG7: A Guide for Youth Engagement in Asia-Pacific's Just Energy Transition., the discussion will address the challenges youth face in contributing to energy transformation and explore policies, partnerships, and investments that can empower them.

The session will provide a platform for young energy leaders, policymakers, and practitioners to exchange transformative ideas, showcase innovative solutions, and propose concrete actions to harness youth potential in advancing sustainable energy and climate goals.

To identify the key educational, institutional, and financial barriers that limit youth
